We have a unique relationship with the team and work together to achieve our shared dream of a povertyfree, empowered and equal community in Ndhiwa.

As the board chair, it has been a pleasure to see the positive impacts that NCEDP's projects have had on the community. We are finding many more girls completing primary school and transitioning into secondary school. Enterprise programmes are also having a significant impact.

Food security among families has been improved and families can now cover the costs of basic needs and are able to educate all of their children, even in secondary school.

Celebrating a Decade of Success!

February 2018 marked ten years since we founded Team Kenya and almost twenty years since I began working with the community in Ndhiwa. It has been a long, hard but extremely rewarding journey.

I am delighted with the progress that Team Kenya has made and to have impacted on over 60,000 people living in Ndhiwa is a remarkable achievement.

It is only fitting that we celebrated reaching such a fantastic milestone with a very successful year. 2018 was our most successful fundraising year to date, which enabled us to expand our work, strengthen our partnership with NCEDP and increase our impact.

Our purpose is to have the most significant impact we possibly can, and I am delighted that in 2018 we were able to do more work than ever to tackle gender inequality.

Our achievements this year include doubling the number of girl friendly primary schools we partner with from 4 to 8, ensuring that many more girls can access safe, good quality education. Unlocking the power of girls and women

"Girls can't do it alone so Team Kenya and NCEDP are engaging the whole community in Ndhiwa in work around gender equality."

Girls around the world desperately want to take control of their lives, but violence and discrimination keep them suppressed and powerless. No matter how hard girls try to improve their lives, they are routinely beaten down by discrimination, prejudice and violence.

We have heard horrifying testimonies of girls and women from Ndhiwa that reveal the severity of the problems they face. Almost without exception, girls and women have been made to feel inferior to boys and men, whether it is at home, in school or in the community.

It is vital that we work together with the community, and our partners, to breakdown the barriers to girls and women's participation in society and unlock their power and potential. Over 50% of girls in Ndhiwa don't make it to secondary school



Roseline's Story

Roseline is 24 years old and is a qualified nurse working at a Mission Hospital in western Kenya. Roseline grew up with her mother, father and five siblings. She is the fourth born out of the six children in the family. Due to her father, who provided the majority of the income to the family, falling ill and being unable to work, Roseline's family was pushed into a difficult situation: "My oldest sister was forced to drop out of school due to a lack of fees, the second and third children had the same issue. I was the only one blessed to get a sponsor who supported me through my high school."

The illness of Roseline's father inspired her to become a nurse, "I have been able to achieve my dream of being a nurse. I decided to be a nurse when I was in class seven at primary school. My father developed a complication and, since he could not afford to go to the hospital, he was just at home suffering. I was



sympathizing with him, but since I could not do anything I wanted to study medicine so that I could understand diseases and help my father. He motivated me towards becoming a nurse."

Roseline is using her income to provide for her family, "I am using my income to care for my parents and to ensure my two younger siblings can continue in education. I want to ensure that they can complete secondary school. I take responsibility for everyone at home."

"I really know and believe that education is the only thing you can give to someone to assist them in the future. Without education, there will be a situation where my family depends on me in the future as they have nothing. My siblings are also bright, so I think that's the best gift I can give them at the moment!"

Our strategy and approach

Strategy

In 2015, Team Kenya devised a new fiveyear strategy, based on our extensive experience working with the community in Ndhiwa and in line with the Global Goals for Sustainable Development, with a focus on girls' education, health and safety in school and in their communities.

In late 2017, our Board of Trustees met and reviewed our strategy, which has a renewed focus on girls' education and safety in particular. Our Comic Relief funded research into school-related gender-based violence has impelled us to work even harder to make Ndhiwa a safe place for girls to live and learn.



Approach

The communities we support in Ndhiwa know what they need - our job is to help make it happen. Since Team Kenya first got to know the communities around Ndhiwa, we have worked very closely with children, parents, teachers, Chiefs and local leaders to achieve our shared dream - communities where girls and women are safe, educated and have an equal chance to succeed.

Our unique relationship with the communities in Ndhiwa allows us the flexibility and understanding to respond to their needs and design programmes that are truly suited to them.

Our approach is to create sustainable, long-term changes in attitudes and behaviours in a way that traditional aid cannot. We believe there is a place for all organisations, large and small, in development. However, when it comes to creating long-lasting solutions that will live on long after we are gone, we believe our approach is unbeatable.






